## **\$250 BILLION ECONOMIC IMPACT** \$61 BILLION IN SALES

The region is the largest cattle feeding region in America totaling 26 million head. Cow-calf sales in this region account for 37% of the national total.



The dairy industry accounts for \$4.9 billion dollars annually.



The 449,896 farms in the region farm 279 million acres - virtually all family-owned businesses.



This region accounts for 34% of the national wheat production; 1.2 billion bushels of corn equivalent to 8% of the national corn production; 1.3 billion pounds of rice; and 89% of the nation's sorghum production.

The region is well known for its ability to successfully produce high-value diversified crops such as; peanuts, wine grapes, sugar, citrus, and other specialty crops.

# **Democratic Reconciliation Package**

- \$740 billion *Inflation Reduction Act --* Climate, Healthcare, Tax.
- Democrats claim the bill will reduce the deficit by \$300 billion over 10 years.
- Estimated to raise \$700+ billion in government revenue over 10 years
  - 15% corporate minimum tax on large firms (profits over \$1 billion)
  - 1% excise tax on the value of stock buybacks
  - \$80 billion for IRS enforcement -87,000 new hires

The Inflation Reduction Act closes about two-thirds of the remaining emissions gap between current policy and the nation's 2030 climate target (50% below 2005)

By driving down the cost of clean energy and other climate solutions, the Act also **makes it easier for states or cities or companies to increase their climate ambitions.** It also reinforces the economic benefits of any future federal regulations. (These dynamic effects of the bill are not captured in this modeling.)

## **Reconciliation:** Ag-Related Provisions BIOFUELS

- \$1-a-gallon tax credit for biomass-based diesel extended through 2024
- \$500 million for blender pumps and other biofuel infrastructure
- \$2 billion for USDA's Rural Energy for America program, which funds renewable energy and energy efficiency projects
- \$9.7 billion to rural co-ops for renewable energy and energy efficiency projects and another \$1 billion in loans for renewable energy projects in rural areas

### **BUREAU OF RECLAMATION**

- \$4 billion for the Bureau of Reclamation to combat drought in the West FARM DEBT RELIEF
  - \$5.3 billion in farm debt relief
    - \$3.1 billion in assistance to "distressed" borrowers who hold direct or guaranteed farm loans
    - \$2.2 billion in payments to farmers who had experienced discrimination in USDA loan programs.

# Reconciliation: Conservation

- Environmental Quality Incentives Program- \$8.45 billion, starting with \$250 million in FY 2023
- Regional Conservation Partnership Program-\$4.95 billion.
- Conservation Stewardship Program- \$3.25 billion
- Agricultural Conservation Easement Program-\$1.4 billion
- \$1 billion to NRCS for conservation **technical assistance**
- \$300 million is allocated to USDA for measuring the impact of agricultural practices on greenhouse gas emissions.

# Disaster Funding

## **EMERGENCY RELIEF PROGRAM**

- 268,541 applicants
- \$6.63 billion total in payments
  - \$5.71 billion in nonspecialty crops
  - \$917.96 million in specialty Crops





## **ERP** Reauthorization

- Reps. Mike Thompson (CA-05), Dan Newhouse (WA-04), Jim Costa (CA-16), Jimmy Panetta (CA-20), Cindy Axne (IA-03) and 17 members introduced the Emergency Relief Program *Reauthorization Act*, which would reauthorize ERP to provide payments for 2022 losses.
- The bill did not include a dollar amount.
  - The authors of the bill have asked USDA to specify how much money is on-hand for the program and how big 2022 losses are projected to be.

# EPA Updates

- Atrazine proposal open for public comments until Oct 7
- Dicamba comment period closes Oct 17
- Over the summer, EPA and the Army Corps of Engineers have hosted Waters of the U.S. roundtables
- The Supreme Court will hear Sackett v EPA (Sackett II) in October. This case seeks to resolve the ongoing debate over the meaning of the "waters of the U.S." under the Clean Water Act.
- In June, the Supreme Court issued a ruling limiting the EPA's ability to regulate greenhouse gas emissions under the Clean Air Act.
- Litigation continues over chlorpyrifos. In March, the EPA said it may allow the insecticide to be used for "non-food" uses.
- Push to reauthorize PRIA early may occur to avoid getting caught up in farm bill debate





# Trade Update



- Awaiting confirmations for Alexis Taylor (Undersecretary of Trade and Foreign Agricultural Affairs) and Doug McKalip (Chief Agriculture Negotiator)
- Biden administration has been hard to pin down on trade policy.
- Ag sales are up 15% from 2021, but inflation adjustment shows up 6%
- Pursuing trade agreements with Kenya and a dozen Indo-Pacific nations through the Indo-Pacific Economic Framework
